Dear Friends,

We are beginning the second week of Advent already, and it seems before we can blink Christmas will be here. Around us there is much hustle and bustle, lots of noise and excitement, and planning and decorating and baking and shopping and sharing and buying and giving and receiving and much good will happening, too...

These few weeks before December 25th need not create a whirl-wind of busyness in our spirits. We can be intentional about spending a few minutes a day with God – in prayer, in Scripture reading, by lighting the advent wreath with our family. This will give us a calm centre amidst the busyness and also open our eyes to see God in all the activity and people and events the season brings.

The Church in her wisdom has given us four weeks to prepare for the birth of Jesus, and then 12 days to celebrate this wonderful gift. When the gift of Emmanuel, God with us, finally arrives, it is "more than we could ever ask or imagine."

You will note how the readings in Advent do not mince the reality of life – they name our brokenness, our sinfulness, how we live with anxiety and fearfulness, how we long for security. They ask us to get in touch with our deepest longings, both for ourselves and for the world.

But they also present the reality of God – that God comes to redeem, to save, to bring new life. "The days are surely coming..." the prophet Jeremiah proclaims. Our readings declare that God's power is greater than any other and that God's word, God's promise will not pass away.

Advent asks us to watch, to wait, to expect God to come into our lives, indeed, to see where God is already breaking in.

As we light the candles of the Advent wreath over four weeks, the light gradually takes over the darkness – something is happening and we trust that more is yet to come. We light the candles of hope, peace, joy, and love, and on Christmas Eve the Christ Candle, signifying the light that has come into the world, "full of grace and truth." (John 1:14)

We have found the one in whom we place our hope, and He has found us. In this we rejoice and give thanks.

On November 7, 2015, I attended the Children's Ministry Leadership Conference at St. John's York Mills. It was a day filled with interesting presentations and an opportunity to network and share what different persons were doing in their churches.

The biggest takeaway from the conference was that parents should be included in children's ministry. The key note speaker gave a very intriguing presentation entitled "Why Your Ministry to Children & Families Matter."

The main message in this presentation was based on four key things that help to nurture faith in children. These are:


- 1. Loving exemplars: Parents and caregivers whose lives are shaped by spiritual discipleship and whose behaviour is consistent with what they profess to believe.
- 2. A Master story: A Bible story that will capture the children's imagination.
- 3. Meaningful Practices: Christian practices in the home tie the family to the practising Christian community.
- 4. A Language of Faith: Telling family faith stories will help faith formation in children.

I pray that we as parents, caregivers and leaders at Holy Family will continue to nurture our children into Christians with the knowledge and love of God.

Synod 2015

The 156th Regular Session of Synod was held November 13 and 14 in Richmond Hill, Ontario. Holy Family was represented by Rev. Julie, Deacon Judy, Norma Deacon, and Susan Winfrow.

The theme for Synod was *Treasures Old and New*, encouraging the best of traditional expressions of the church and of Fresh Expressions.

Following Eucharist and lunch, the business of Synod began with the Archbishop's charge. "We are called to be in uncomfortable places at the edge of chaos," he explained. The first of two major Constitution and Canons changes were discussed. This motion would change the makeup of Regular Synod, by reduc-

ing the number of both Lay members and clergy who would be members of Synod. The motion included the following changes:

Lay membership to be determined by average Sunday attendance:

1-249 1 lay member 250-499 2 lay members > 499 3 lay members

This motion was defeated.

The second motion removed all reference to mandatory retirement age (70 years) for all office holders, including clergy. This would align with the policy in Ontario. The motion was approved. (88%)

There was networking and socializing at the sponsors table outside the main hall. There were Bibles and books on sale, and

pamphlets were distributed. We greeted priests who served at Holy Family in the past, and greeted former parishioners who are now priests. We made new friends.

We accomplished a lot. The missional moments highlighted our church in action reaching out to others who are outside the box: community breakfasts; a thrift shop; a youth drop in; Mandarin ministry; to name a few.
