In her book *Radical Gratitude*, Mary Jo Leddy, a Toronto activist, theologian, and founder of Romero House for Refugees, states that gratitude involves a radical satisfaction with life, with oneself, and with the world. This gratitude is rooted in the awareness that we have already been given the most fundamental necessity, the gift of life. When we stop taking for granted this gift of life itself, we can begin to experience the radical liberation of gratitude.

To acknowledge that just this gift of life itself is enough – when we can accept the gift of our own being – transforms us at a deeply spiritual level and begins to touch other levels of our lives as well. I'm sure we've all been out on a beautiful day and experienced an overwhelming gratitude for everything – the trees, the sky, the people around us, the fresh air

breathed into our lungs. And the beauty of the fall season brings this to bear even more.

When we know we are created by and rooted in a God of love, it changes everything. It is a kind of liberation – liberation from a culture that tells us our value lies in our possessions, our achievements, or our status.

Gratitude for the gift of life God gives us pushes us to move beyond ourselves, to seek the Kingdom of God and to direct our energy and resources generously towards that end.

In the Kingdom of God, the economy of grace supplants the economy of scarcity, in which we are

always worried there won't be enough. The economy of grace says there is more than enough, more than enough food, more than enough clothing, more than enough love...and that God's power working in us, "can do more than we can ask or imagine."

Every Sunday we gather here to celebrate the Eucharist – which is Greek for "Thanksgiving."

In our Eucharist we come together to give thanks for the gift of life, for the gift of Jesus who dwells in and among us as light and life, and for the gift of one another.

As the hymn puts it, "For the wonders that astound us, for the truths that still confound us, most of all, that love has found us, thanks be to God."

International Corner — Milk Rice — A Sri Lankan Favourite

One of the strengths of Holy Family is that we draw our congregation from all corners of the world. This is the first in a series celebrating our diversity. Please send next edition's item to The Editor. We shall publish in December, so a Christmas favourite would be most welcome.

This is a very traditional Sri Lankan breakfast dish, prepared for almost every occasion... birthday, wedding, first day of school, first day of the month, a must for the first day of the year, Easter Sunday, Christmas Morning, etc...

It can be served savoury or sweet. Sri Lankans like it savoury served with a spicy fish or meat curry or our hot and spicy "Lunu Miris" (finely chopped onions, chili, lime and salt)

2 cups Basmathi Rice

2 ½ cups water

1 can Coconut milk (2 cups)

2 tsp Salt or more (as desired)

Rinse/wash Rice once or twice or till water runs clear. Place washed rice in pan with water and cook on medium heat. Add Salt. Stir well and let cook. Once rice is cooked and while there is still some water add one cup coconut milk, stir, taste (add salt if necessary).

Add more coconut milk and let cook for five to ten minutes. Stirring occasionally so doesn't stick to bottom. It is ready to be plated when rice leaves sides of pan when stirring.

To serve... Spread flat about one to two inches high and cut in squares.

Stewardship!

The word, *stewardship*, simply means managing someone else's property. For us Christians, as Scripture proclaims everything belongs to God, we manage the property of our Lord. Since everything belongs to Christ, we need to have the attitude and view that our things are His things, that all we could have now, all we have lost, all we will have, are His, including our spiritual gifts. So, our duty, as Christians, is to learn how to become responsible stewards of our Lord's resources entrusted into our care.

Stewardship can be an act of love, and even fun! It can be a response to His love, which will give us much, much greater comfort than any plans or ideas on our part. Many of us Christians want to give, but we don't know how. Maybe we just need to be told that all we have is not really ours to begin with. We are just temporary stewards of His treasures, time and talents. With such a view, we may see a pleasure in giving, and see the benefits as they help build the body of Christ.

- Stewardship enables us to give God gratitude for what He did for us and recognize His sovereignty, which is His control and ownership of all things. In this way we can honor Him with our worship as well as with our material goods and abilities.
- Stewardship is about being in community, working together and complementing one another's gifts, and abilities, and with what we can offer. It is the way we use the gifts He has given us to benefit the people in our church and those around us.
- Stewardship means giving in proportion to what we can. The poor person's small gift is just as important as the rich person's big gift! (Mark 12:41-44), Sometimes, we cannot give as much

- as we would like to, due to economic realities, job loss, business not good, sickness, etc., so, we give honestly and efficiently whatever we can.
- Stewardship is the giving of ourselves and our resources with joy and gratitude for what we have been given. Giving should always be cheerful! If it is not, then we are not really giving—are we?
- Stewardship is focusing on God and not on the material things in and of themselves. We are always to view the material world with the perspective of being God's caretaker of it, not of its lust or greed.
- Stewardship is recognizing our gifts and abilities as well as opportunities, then exercising the responsibility of their care. It is also cooperation with other stewards, to work as a team.
- When we serve God and when we give, it is never in vain. It is never forgotten by the One Who counts!
- Stewardship is the glorification of our Lord and Saviour.

With this information in mind, how are you going to respond to Him with the time, treasures, and talent in your life?

As our stewardship campaign comes to a close, at Holy Family, we ask that you prayerfully decide on how you plan to implement God's desires and call to be a better steward of all the relationships, time, talent, money, and resources in your life!

Who are the Wardens and what do they do?

Canon 15 of the Diocese takes four pages to describe the qualifications, powers, duties and manner of appointment of the Churchwardens. Not once do the words "gratitude" or "thanks" appear in the canon, and yet those are the words that ought to spring to our minds when we think of the Wardens and what they do on our behalf.

Much of the Canon is concerned about money and finances: recommending the budget to Vestry and monitoring the results are an important part of the Wardens role. The Treasurer reports to the Wardens and, officially, the reports that the Treasurer presents to the Advisory Board from time to time and to the Vestry at the annual meeting, are the Wardens' reports.

The Wardens are responsible for certain aspects of the Services, although the responsibility for the Service itself rests with the Incumbent. However, it is the Wardens who have to ensure that there is wine (and

a chalice and flagon), and bread (and a paten or plate), plus linen, collection plates, service books and Registers for Services, Baptisms, Confirmations, and Burials. In fact many of those responsibilities are looked after by The Altar Guild.

However, there are some tasks that rest with the Wardens themselves. All aspects of the church

property are their responsibility, including arranging for insurance, all forms of maintenance, heating, ventilation and cleaning. They must also, in the words

of the Canon not allow the church "to be used for profane purposes."

The duties of the Wardens apply to all Wardens in all churches.

Here at Holy Family there are several things that the Wardens have done in the past year in addition to fulfilling their responsibilities under the Canon.
