
As a Deacon, I am called to serve, but some of my usual ways to serve are cut off in this Pandemic time.

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Vestry Highlights

Vestry, our "Annual General Meeting", was held, by Zoom, on February 28, 2021.

- Despite the pandemic, which closed the church for most of 2020, a combination of diocesan support, reduced expenditure and parishioners continuing their givings, we finished the year with a surplus of \$41K. Well done us!
- We approved the 2021 budget, with a deficit of \$20K.
- Audited statements for both 2019 & 2020 were approved.
- We were glad to welcome our auditor, Peter Tsui, to the meeting.
- The Envelope Secretary reported on givings, noting

that Pre-Authorized Remittances (PAR) were a useful way to support the church. (See a separate note.)

- About 20 reports from parish organization were submitted and approved.
- Special thanks were expressed to the lawn cutting volunteers.
- About 40 people were elected, appointed or volunteered for various parish positions.
- Felix, Premod and Reuben continue as Wardens. They have been joined by Charmaine Bruce who was appointed Deputy Rector's Warden, a position she accepted earlier in the year. A photo and brief bio appear below.

Charmaine Bruce is the new Deputy Rector's Warden and a continuing Advisory Board Member. After having been a visiting member for several years with her mom, Geneva, and daughter, SyMonae, Charmaine joined them as a regular Holy Family member in 2018. She is also a volunteer with our Y@H group.

A Visit to Canterbury Cathedral

One of the most relaxing and inspiring ways to start each day is to join the Dean of Canterbury Cathedral, The Very Rev. Dr. Robert Willis for morning prayer broadcast every day during the pandemic.

7:00 am here is early afternoon in England and the daily prayer session is already posted on YouTube.

Broadcast from the deanery garden, or its greenhouse, or sometimes indoors, the Dean takes about half an hour to present prayers, a Bible reading, a discussion about the reading, a Psalm, a comment on significant anniversaries and anything else that occurs to him. It is a very peaceful way to start the day.

The Dean speaks on other topics too.

Black History Month!

Holy Family celebrated BHM with creativity and fun this year – Rev. Julie, Canon Judy, Carol Estwick and the Social Committee had the challenge of putting together events and activities completely online, but this also enabled new things to happen. We still managed to come together to learn, to celebrate, to sing, to pray, to share, and to listen! This year our services had an emphasis on the positive aspects of Black History including the accomplishments and triumphs of black people especially in Canada.

On Feb 19, we were joined by a local author, Eleanor Beharie, who shared a reflection about attending Jamaica's 1962 Independence Day celebrations. During the evening, members of the congregation also shared memories of growing up in countries like Ghana, Trinidad & Tobago, Barbados and Jamaica. Though our ability to travel has been curtailed for the moment, Eleanor was also able to pique our interest by relating a story of her trip to Holy Land.

On Feb 26, An Evening of Positivity was presented by the Social Committee. We learned about the great Kings and Queens of Africa such as Akhenaton and Nefertiti, Taharqa and King Mansa Musa I. Various members of the Social Committee presented their personal stories of positivity to counteract the negativity that has been sparked by the many events that have devastatingly affected black people in the past year. It was a very informative and educational evening.

During our services, we were blessed to have Nicole Salmon share poetry and speak from the heart about being a black fundraiser and her experience of being a co-editor of the book *Collecting Courage*.



The Young People of Holy Family made us all exceptionally proud when they spoke so eloquently about navigating spaces as a young black person and what effective allyship can look like. We were blessed as well by Bruno's saxophone renditions of gospel favorites. It was great to see our future leaders so engaged and passionate!

As interest in poetry globally has been renewed by Amanda Gorman's presentation at the Inauguration, so we were happy to have Alyesha Hamilton grace us again with a beautiful spoken word performance.



On the final Sunday of Black History Month, The Rev. Dr. Alison Kemper's homily urged us to question what is missing from the information we've been given and to consider how actions of the past might be influencing decisions of today. With reference to the insightful book Accounting for Slavery, Dr Kemper thoughtfully presented a new perspective on some often quoted views.

Sergei provided favorites like "Revive us Again" and lots of uplifting music during the services, and every day something relating to BHM was posted to the HF FB page.

So far, feedback on Black History Month has been overwhelmingly positive and the focus on the positive aspects of black people and history was very welcome. We look forward to next year's celebrations!

Connecting to Holy Family Service Live Streams...and more!

We are grateful to God for the strides we have made as a church community over the past few months. Initially, the obstacle in front of us was understandably huge and potentially insurmountable but thanks to the grace of God and the commitment of everyone to step out of our comfort zone, we have been able to crawl out of it and are now walking. Glory to God.

Our attendance on zoom has increased from an average

of 22 parishioners when we started in November to an average of 57 within the past few weeks with a record high of 61 during one of the Black History month services. Our live stream on Facebook averages about 25-30 participants with a lot more views afterwards.

Are you a parishioner and having challenges with devices or need one to enhance your worship experience? Please reach out to the incumbent or wardens for support.

With the increased usage of zoom, it requires more data for connectivity with attendant increase in cost. Are you

looking at alternative options for data? The most feasible and cheaper options are data packages on mobile phones that can be streamed to other devices. Most of the network service providers – Virgin, Rogers, Bell, Fido, Telus have packages for data and calls – They typically range from \$20 to \$45 per month depending on the data volume required. To

explore these options you may want to reach out to the respective customer service numbers. If you require basic advice on what they typically have in the market, the Technical unit can assist.

We are excited at the opportunity to journey with everyone in our outreach and missions. We look forward to sharing more news in the subsequent editions of the *Heartbeat*.

It may be some time before we meet our "new" bishop: the Trent-



Durham area, her primary responsibility, is the largest in the diocese, extending from Pickering to Brighton and as far north as Algonquin Provincial Park.

Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR)

At Vestry, the Envelope Secretary, Jaya Rajan, reported on PAR and other offerings. In case you are not familiar with the mechanics of PAR, here they are:

- 1. You sign up through the Envelope Secretary for whatever amount you choose.
- 2. On a fixed day every month, your bank transfers your donation to Holy Family parish account.
- 3. You receive a receipt at tax time .

Not only does each PAR donor support the church, whether a person is there or not, there is a saving as envelopes do not have to be bought and the Wardens and Treasurer can budget more effectively.


